

9 Exhibitions to See in London this Spring








Introduction

Digital Clouds Don't Carry Rain

16 February to 1 June

In this thought-provoking exhibition, Mexican-British artist Mónica Alcázar-Duarte raises critical questions – where does knowledge lie? Who and what is classified? The artist's evocative, layered, self-portrait photographs examine western society's obsession with speed, expansion and resource accumulation at a time when ecological disaster looms. The images are presented alongside the short film U K'ux Kaj / Heart of sky, Mayan god of storms (2023-24), produced at Maní in the Yucatán Peninsula.





This year's shortlisted artists of the prestigious Deutsche Börse Photography Foundation Prize include Valie Export, Gauri Gill and Rajesh Vangad, Lebohang Kganye and Hrair Sarkissian. An exhibition of the shortlisted and winning works will be on show at The Photographers' Gallery until 2 June 2024. Themes explored by this year's shortlist include urgent concerns, from the remnants of war and conflict, experiences of diasporic communities and decolonisation, to contested land, heritage, equality and gender.
